

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT —

The Sisters of Mercy were founded out of a deep concern for persons who are poor. FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK -

Along with the changing temperatures and landscape, there have also been many changes at Notre Dame since the start of the year. Change can take a little time to accept and adjust, and as I reflect on some of the things we've done differently this year, I appreciate all of your patience and input as we've made strides to make improvements.



During the first week of school, students may have noticed that our lunch lines moved a bit more slowly as they were getting acclimated to using our new management software, Nourish. Not only does Nourish enable our food services department the ability to manage payments, but it also helps track the food being purchased and therefore the inventory being ordered from our vendors. Our financial director has already reported a school savings since utilizing Nourish. Now that we have the kinks worked out and the students have their codes committed to memory, we're ready to take our food services offering a step further by offering breakfast items (beyond bagels), as well as expanding our lunch menu starting next semester.

Also at the beginning of the year, Notre Dame joined other area schools in introducing Schedule Galaxy to help manage and improve communication with regards to athletic practices and game scheduling. From what I've heard, this has helped minimize confusion, particularly with regards to last minute changes that are at times unavoidable. We have now also added Family ID for our student athletes to help streamline the team registration process, which should minimize frustrations as well as paper.

Family ID isn't limited to athletics, however. We are currently setting up Family ID so that we may extend this to online registration. We also hope to offer course requests online for our students. Our teachers are currently collaborating within their departments to determine what courses best serve our students' needs. By offering course requests online, this will help us more efficiently determine how well we're meeting their requests, thereby giving us adequate time to make adjustments before schedules are finalized for next year.



Earlier this month, our football players claimed the intersectional and regional titles, becoming champions for eight-man football in its inaugural year for Notre Dame. Coach D'Aloisio wisely advised us to make this move in response to other small schools switching to eight-man football, primarily out of safety concerns for our players. With fewer players on the field, the added space not only helps reduce the chance of injury, but has also offered some exciting games. Our guys trusted Coach D that he had their best interests at heart, learned the new system of play, and came out on top. I couldn't ask for more of them.

Another transition this year was the welcoming of our new theater director, Cody Riker. With the departure of Mr. Matthews after seven years of delivering top-notch performances, to say there were big shoes to fill would be an understatement. Again, our students put their faith in change, and the result was spectacular. After witnessing students giving up their Sunday afternoons and countless weekday evenings, I could not be more proud of their commitment and drive. I applaud Mr. Riker and another newcomer, our band director, Ms. Morgan Decker, for treading through new waters and delivering a spectacular performance that made our students shine.

Finally, you may have noticed our website has received a facelift. Mr. Allington is still tweaking it to make it more user friendly, as well as to remove some of the snags we've encountered. It should be fully functional in December, but we welcome your input to make it best suit your needs and interests.

7th & 8th Grade News -





Guidance Department -

College Applications

College application season has begun in the Guidance Office! Below is a checklist with some general and useful guidelines:

- **CHECKING DEADLINES:** Students should be checking the application deadlines for schools that they are interested in to make sure they will be able to have everything in on time.
 - **REQUESTING LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATIONS:** Seniors need to give teachers at least two weeks to write their letter. Teachers should be provided with a resume or fact sheet, a list of schools the letter should be submitted to and a deadline to submit the letter. **Letters should be requested online through Naviance.**
 - **REQUESTING TRANSCRIPTS:** Students must fill out a **transcript request form** for every school they apply to. This needs to be done at least two weeks in advance of your deadline and the **forms** can be found in the **Guidance Office**. For any applications due January 1st, the transcript request forms must be submitted to your counselor no later than December 8th.
 - **APPLICATION SUPPORT:** Mrs. Barron, Mrs. Shannon, and Mr. Moore are available by 8 am every morning, until at least 3:30pm every afternoon. Students are encouraged to stop in any time or schedule an appointment for application support or review with Mrs. Barron. Parents are also encouraged to call, email or schedule an appointment with Mrs. Barron if they have any questions.

Juniors and Seniors should check the college representative's visitation schedule posted at the top of the stairs by the Guidance Office, in Junior and Senior homerooms, and in the Weekly Update. Students are highly encouraged to attend these sessions, even for schools they are not initially interested in.

El Día de los Muertos ~ The Day of the Dead

El Día de los Muertos is a cultural celebration from Mexico dating back to the time of the Aztecs. It is still celebrated today in Mexico, America and in other parts of the Spanish speaking world as a joyous time to welcome back the spirits of the dead. Here at Notre Dame, Sra. Agan's and Sra. Liriano's Spanish classes took time out to learn about el Dia de los Muertos, honor family members that have passed away and celebrate their lives.

When is it celebrated?

November 1st and 2nd

What are some activities associated with the Day of the Dead?

Creating an ofrenda to display pictures of departed family, eating lots of food, and listening to music.

What are some other traditions associated with el Día de los Muertos?

The flower often used in decorating ofrendas (altars) is the marigold.

A deceased person's spirit cannot cross into the land of the living unless their picture is on an ofrenda. Ofrendas are also decorated with the deceased person's favorite food, such as Bread of the Dead and Mole, a chicken dish with spices and chocolate. Families clean and decorate grave sites, often spending the overnight hours there, singing, eating and dancing in remembrance of their beloved family members.

As a special treat, Sra. Agan hosted professional face painter, Jennifer Sekella, in room 204. Many students took advantage of Ms. Sekella's artwork to celebrate.



Music Department -

The past couple of weeks have offered some exciting opportunities for our young singers in grades 7-9. On October 26, five Notre Dame students volunteered to participate in the Young Men's Chorus Festival, hosted by the collegiate chapter of the **American Choral Directors Association at Mansfield University**. Our young men in grades eight and nine joined 130 other singers in their age group from around New York and Pennsylvania for a day full of singing, listening, and learning about the changing male voice.

For 19 years, the Young Men's Choral Festival (YMCF) has been a day filled with music designed for the young male vocal ensemble. Encouraging male participation in chorus is not always an easy feat. This annual festival gives young men the chance to sing in a massed choir with peers who also enjoy singing, without feeling intimidated by outside influences.

Participating students spent the morning and afternoon in rehearsals for the culminating performance in Steadman Theater. This year, the festival choir was directed by Mrs. Donna Knott, Director of the York County Junior Honors Choir. Mrs. Knott has an extensive background in the development of young voices that is equally matched by her passion for the subject. The young men's festival choir also met and rehearsed with the collegiate male a cappella group, the MU Steadmen, who performed a rousing finale with them at the concert. In the middle of the day, a master class given by male college vocal soloists and small ensembles, including a Barbershop quartet, sang for the students and answered questions about their interest in music, vocal technique, and more. Overall, this was an educational experience that supported these young men's passion for music, gave a new push to embrace music, and validated and helped them to understand that they do not stand alone as they continue to sing and grow.

Another outstanding celebration of our young Notre Dame singers' accomplishments occurred in early November at the **NYSSMA (New York State School Music Association) Junior Area All State** music festival in Hornell, NY. In order to be eligible to perform in the honors ensembles at this prestigious event, students had to perform an audition by preparing a solo last spring and performing it for a NYSSMA judge. Students in our region of New York State who had the highest scores on those solos were invited to participate in the Area All State festival. Notre Dame had students in both the Treble Choir and the Mixed Choir this year.

These young singers not only received individual coaching for months from January to April of 2018, but then after being accepted to Area All State, met for weekly rehearsals to learn the demanding music programmed for the honors ensembles during the month of October. On Friday and Saturday, November 2-3, these students spent about 12 hours in rehearsal with renowned conductors and some of the best singers in their age group in this region of NY state.

The Treble Choir had the unique honor of performing a premiere of the song "My Fairest Companion", arranged specifically for their ensemble by Emma Tyme, who currently studies composition at Ithaca College. These young singers had the honor of meeting the composer and working with her directly on the challenging Irish decorative style of the melody, while learning about the song's origin. Ms. Tyme shared with the singers that she wrote the melody to this tune while doing a 300-mile solo hike in Vermont. On her journey, she described developing a relationship with the creek that ran alongside her hike, and the connection she felt to the earth around her. It isn't often that students get to meet a living composer and work side by side with her on a premiere performance of her work. It was an honor I'm sure our Notre Dame students will not soon forget.

We would like to recognize and congratulate Notre Dame's first **NYSSMA Conference All State singer, Lucy Kaffenbarger**, who will be performing in the **Eastman Theater** with the **All State Treble Chorus** on **Saturday, December 1st at 8:00 pm** under the direction of Dr. Sharon Hansen.

Throughout my years at Notre Dame, I have had the opportunity to participate in some very unique experiences, especially within the music department. I've gone on multiple band trips to compete in Washington, D.C., Nashville, and Boston. Last year's experience was highlighted by a choir trip to sing at the world famous Carnegie Hall in NYC with the National Youth Choir. This year, as my senior year begins, I've had yet another amazing opportunity to add to the musical repertoire-a senior internship here at ND.

In preparation for pursuing a Music Education degree, I've gotten to work closely with Mrs. Easton and Ms. Decker in the music department to design an internship that will help me learn the vital skills I'll need in order to kick start my educational experiences in becoming a music teacher. Under the guidance of Ms. Decker, I've been appointed as "Assistant Junior High Band Director". I've been able to work with the Jr. High Band during rehearsals and have had the great opportunity to begin teaching some weekly lessons, hoping to share important musicianship skills that students can take with them for the rest of their playing careers. In December, I will have the great fortune to conduct the Jr. High Band in an arrangement of Disney's *Beauty and The Beast*, which will be debuted during the Winter Concert.

I am truly thankful to the faculty and administration of Notre Dame who allowed me to pursue this internship including Mrs. Franklin, Mrs. Barron, Mrs. Easton, and my wonderful advisor Ms. Decker. If you are interested in gaining real world experience in a career field that you might like to pursue in college, I highly recommend checking out the possibility of a Senior Internship. It is a great way to gather practical, first hand knowledge and engage with professionals who are eager to support students in experiencing all the career has to offer. When I first thought of becoming a Music Educator I was really hoping to someday impact the lives of students much the way my own music teachers have inspired me. Having the opportunity to experience teaching music in real life has continued to inspire me to keep reaching for all my musical goals and dreams. I am leaving Notre Dame knowing I am ready to make music my passion and inspire others to make music in their own lives!


