FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK —

Now that we're three weeks into the Lenten season (and in the spirit of our recent break from school), I decided to shift gears away from school business this month and focus on Lent.

When I was a kid, Ash Wednesday was one of my least favorite days of the year. To me, it signaled the start of my entire family giving up sweets and having to go to church much more frequently over the next 40+ days. As an adult, I view it more like I see the beginning of the new year. It's a time for reflection and reevaluation of who I am and what I need to do to be the "best version" of myself. (If you are familiar with Matthew Kelly, you know what I'm talking about. If you don't know him, I highly encourage you to look him up online and join his "Best Lent Ever" series).

At Notre Dame HS, we celebrated the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday, whereby the students led a moving service as we worshipped together through scripture and music. Aside from the distribution of ashes, one of the most powerful parts of the service was a silent skit whereby Christ triumphed over Satan and his temptations. Through the presentation by the students, it was strikingly evident that the primary character was captive to a multitude of sins. As the skit silently unfolded, it became clear that all the person who was struggling had to do was to have faith. To relieve him of the chains that were binding him, he needed to trust and reach out to Christ. It seems so simple, but it left me thinking about how often do I actually let go of worry and stress and let God take over? When I do ask for help, am I doing my part, not just to help myself but to reach out to others in need?

In the same vein, during Lent, I have often heard Catholics joke:, "Whatever you do, don't give up chocolate for Lent!" No, they don't have ties to the confectionery industry; rather, they are suggesting that if you give up something that is a sacrifice but in doing so makes those around you miserable, then it becomes pointless. Taking it a step further, giving up something without actually serving as a benefit to anyone is actually a missed opportunity.

Recently, Mrs. McCaig asked me if I would consider allowing an "out of dress code day" on Friday before our winter break. The money collected would be donated to the Catholic Charities Rice Bowl to help those in need of food. We agreed on a suggested donation of \$5 but that students could give what they felt they could give. On Friday morning, I greeted students happily out of uniform, eager to drop their money in the good will offering bucket for the cause. One girl approached me and said she was going to ask for some money back but had changed her mind. I looked to see her holding a \$20 bill. Clearly, I had plenty of change in the jar I was holding. When I asked if she was sure, she hesitated only for a second, said yes, dropped in her money, and smiled as she walked away. I didn't ask her if that was her allowance money, but I was proud of her. Her friends weren't around. Her parents weren't there. She just wanted to give. As soon as she committed to giving more than she needed, she clearly had no regrets. Instead, she felt good about her decision. That got me to thinking about how much I actually give back to people, with my time, talents and treasure. Yep, there's definitely room for improvement for me in that area as well.

As we move further into this Lenten season I hope you will ponder the words of Matthew Kelly, "Every moment of every day, every situation, every person we encounter is an opportunity to become a better version of ourselves". Let's not look at Lent as a time of doom and gloom but as a time to feel God's presence in our hearts and let His light shine brightly through our works. God bless you!

7th& 8th Grade News —

March roared in like a lion in 2018. Our students started March off with energy as well, on the Chorus/Music trip to Mansfield University for *West Side Story* and by competing in the Third Annual Dumpling Competition.

Applications for scholarships for our 8th graders who will be attending ND for high school are available on the ND website, www.notredamehighschool.com. The due date for all applications is Friday, March 16. Those students applying for the Academic Scholarship must take the Writing Test on Saturday, March 24, at 9:30 am here at ND. I will meet with all of the 8th graders to explain the scholarships and the application process.

As you may know, high school students in New York State take Regents exams at the end of certain major high school courses to earn credit towards their high school diplomas. Regents exams are often a student's first experience with a one-day high stakes test and nervousness abounds. The best way to prepare for tests like these is to practice and the NYS Tests in English Language Arts and Math are perfect opportunities for our students to gain confidence and get that practice. We are counting on all of our students taking these tests. The English Language Arts test will be held on April 11-12. Besides giving students practice, these tests are very useful in helping us to identify gaps in learning, so that we can help remedy those gaps. This year's tests have been shortened to 2 days each. Like last year, the tests do not have limited time, as long as the student is working productively. The Math tests will be given on May 1-2, during the school day, for all 7th and 8th graders who are not taking a Regents (high school) math course. If you have concerns about these tests, please do not hesitate to contact me.

Under the guidance of our DePuy Synthes engineers, STEM Club continues to challenge our students to think about science, engineering, technology and math to solve problems. Our latest ventures are into electronics. We are also currently working on adding a Robotics program for our 7th and 8th graders for next year.

As Lent proceeds, our junior high students are reaching out to serve. Our work at the community kitchen on the first Wednesdayof each month continues. Additionally, we have 7th and 8th graders working hard at Youth Court in both Elmira and Horseheads, and they are volunteering at nursing homes, as Scouts, and in a myriad of other roles. Notre Dame is participating in Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowl to feed the hungry globally, as well as to support our own Community Kitchen Ministry.

I wish you peace and time during Lent to find God in the ordinary things.

I am not a cradle Catholic. My parents did not choose my religion. I did! And yet, somehow, I managed to fall into the child-like mentality that giving up something I loved was enough to satisfy my Lenten obligation. In recent years, I have realized how trite my sacrifices have been. I hope your Lent is good for your soul. I hope it brings you closer to our Lord. Whether you are giving up chocolate, putting down others or something else, may your offerings be presented to our Lord with sincere and deserving love. He gave us His all, holding nothing back. Even 2000 years later, it's hard to wrap my head around this kind of love. May we all keep Cavalry on our radar, beyond these 40 Days.





The Notre Dame Great American Sale has something for everyone!



The month was kicked off with a performance for sixth grade students visiting Notre Dame from Holy Family Elementary, St. Mary Our Mother School, Namaste Montessori in Ithaca, and also a few sixth grade visitors from area schools. The performance was energetic and engaging and a true expression of our music students' passion! As the performance unfolded, our young nervous visitors could not resist the enthusiasm of our talented Notre Dame musicians and became full participants in our performance. At the end of the same week, our choir students enjoyed taking a trip to see West Side Story at Mansfield University. Not only did the students enjoy the production, they had a wonderful opportunity to take a sneak peek back stage and meet many of the college students involved in the production of this award winning musical.

Over St. Patrick's Day Weekend our Notre Dame choir will be headed to **Carnegie Hall** to perform with the **National Youth Choir.** This year, the National Youth Choir will be under the direction of Dr. Anton Armstrong, world-renowned conductor of the St. Olaf Choir. This will be the choir's second year performing with this amazing choir. In 2016, the Notre Dame Choir had earned a qualifying score at the Washington Heritage Festival. Choirs with qualifying scores are invited for the next three consecutive years to perform with the National Youth Choir (an honor choir) at Carnegie Hall. Native of Elmira, Mr. Bates studied at the San Francisco Conservatory and now travels the country performing with Florida Grand Opera and Opera Saratoga companies. He is in town preparing for a local performance, "Viva Italia! Italian Opera Highlights" with fellow opera singer, Elena Galvan, on March 18th at 3:00pm at the Park Church in Elmira. Mr. Bates will be visiting our high school choir students on **Tuesday, March 13th**, to give a presentation and lecture about his life as a performer, his development as a singer, and advice for young singers. A lucky handful of students will have the opportunity to be coached in a vocal Master Class for two hours after school by this resident expert. These students are preparing challenging vocal solos for the upcoming NYSSMA Solo Festival and music scholarship contests. Master classes are usually given at the college level and above, and are a chance for advanced students to receive expert advice from a distinguished master in their field. In a master class, all the students observe and listen as the master works with one student at a time. Given in a private setting, a handful of Notre Dame students will perform their pieces, receive live feedback and demonstration from Mr. Bates, and perform again while applying these techniques. In the classical performance world, master classes are considered to be one of the most essential elements in developing a young musician's technique, and one of the best ways to prepare for competition or performance. We are honored to give our students this opportunity.
