**FROM THE DESK OF THE HEAD OF SCHOOL -**

One of the best parts about my role at Notre Dame High School is the classroom observations I conduct. Spending a class period observing our teachers and students in action helps rejuvenate me; I never cease to be amazed by the creativity and energy of our teachers as well as the ability of our students to rise to their level of expectations. I often get too caught up in paperwork and deadlines to simply see what is right in front of me. Over the past few months, I have listened to the beautiful sounds of our gifted students and teachers in choir and band, seen students fascinated by chemical reactions, observed students successfully speaking in foreign languages, and heard students debate an issue more effectively (and with much more respect) than most adults would. I have witnessed them make connections and apply critical thinking to solve math problems and have even heard students attempting to sell ice-cream to zombies. I will confess that the one class that surprised me the most, prompting me to reflect more than I ever anticipated, was Coach Young’s physical education class. My experience in observing a PE class until this point had been limited to watching a coach go through the rules of a game and then hoping that nobody became injured as the game unfolded. My experience in observing a PE class until this point, however, had been limited to *public* schools.

This was different. Coach Young introduced the students to sled hockey, which he explained was not only a real sport but that the U.S. Paralympic Sled Team was *really* good. He had gone out of his way to purchase supplies to give students as closely as possible the ability to experience what it was like to play the real game. I saw his students awkwardly using their hands as they pushed along on scooters to navigate across the gym floors, careful not to use their legs. Coach Young then gathered the students together and explained that many of the players on the U.S. Paralympic Sled Team were not born with impairments; many of them lost the use of their legs for various reasons. They all had setbacks, but they chose to focus on what they had versus what they did not. He spoke of one player in particular who was one of the most positive people he had ever met. The player was grateful for his family, knowing that others were not surrounded by loved ones. He was grateful for the meal he enjoyed last night, knowing so many go hungry. He continued with other examples. Coach Young also showed a prayer of gratitude, something that would not have been shared at my previous public school. I left class that day thinking about how often I ask God for favors rather than show appreciation for what I already have. What a great lesson!

## 7th & 8th GRADE

April brings showers and May flowers! April also brings the last round of college notifications to our seniors. I am so proud of all of their achievements and acceptances, from sea (Coastal Carolina) to shining sea (Pepperdine). From the University of Tampa in the south to SUNY Potsdam in the north, Crusaders have been accepted all over the USA. Colleges range from schools of music to medical school to the Ivy League to community colleges to an aeronautical university. The class of 2019 has what we hoped for them: the choices and options that will launch them on the way to their dreams. We encourage everyone to come upstairs and check out the Guidance Bulletin Board where all the acceptances are listed. In mid-May, check out the main bulletin board which will be dedicated to the Class of 2019 and their futures.



**ELA** Our 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders are headed towards their dreams as well, although not quite so far, just yet. They worked very hard on their NYS ELA tests and will be facing the next testing “scrimmage” for math, on May 1 and 2. Part of the unique ND experience is that we bring college prep to grades 7-12, not just to juniors and seniors. Taking the tests is a pure win for the students—they gain experience with the test-taking procedures, documents, and question types, and they will get help if or when we identify a weakness. The test scores are **NOT** kept on student records that will eventually become the transcripts sent out to colleges.

On Thursday, May 2, we will be having our annual Career Day, organized by Mrs. Jean Coons and the Career Development Council. Mrs. Coons has been very active, contacting speakers and planning our sessions. We are expecting Notre Dame alums and parents, as well as community members, from a broad range of fields. The students will be given a selection form to choose the speakers they would like to hear. We thank all of our speakers in advance—Career Day has consistently been rated very positively by our students as useful, interesting, and fun.



Eighth grade scientists in Ms. Petrie’s Science 8 classes will be taking the NYS Science Performance (Lab) assessment on Wednesday, May 22, and the written test on June 4. These tests are quite similar to the NYS Science assessments given in 4<sup>th</sup> grade, are based on the traditional NYS Science Standards, and our students have done very well on them in the past. Eighth graders in Earth Science will be taking the Regents exam in Earth Science in June.

Mr. Pipher’s students in American History 7 and 8 have just completed projects and presentations. Each 7<sup>th</sup> grade class had its own March Madness bracket to determine winning inventions including dynamite, antibiotics, electromagnets, and blueprints. The 8<sup>th</sup> graders’ March Madness on Influential women included Rosie the Riveter, Amelia Earhart, and Susan B. Anthony. The 8<sup>th</sup> graders are also developing their own primary sources by collecting oral histories from people who lived through events like the Vietnamese War, September 11, living with a Palestinian Family during a border closing, and the Boston Marathon Bombing. We are grateful for teachers like Mr. Pipher who make their subjects come alive while preparing our students to think creatively, ask critical questions, and analyze information.

The faculty joins me in wishing you great joy as we complete our Lenten journey and enter into the Miracle of Easter and the relaxation and peace of Spring Break, April 15-22.

## SENIOR INTERNSHIP KALPANA SHARMA'19



For my internship, I worked in several departments at H. Austin Snyder Elementary School in Sayre. I experienced kindergarten through 5th grade classrooms, as well as Special Education. From this experience, I observed all the difficulties which those children were facing and trying their best to learn. In life skills, I learned there is a lot more to education than reading and math. I watched that those children wash and brush their teeth at school, and are given clean clothes if needed. Head lice is rampant in the classroom. Basic hygiene was the first lesson of the day for some children. I also learned that many children get food supplies sent to their homes every Friday, to nourish them over the weekend. The best part of life skills room experience was that the children were so friendly, and I received many hugs from them.

My second experience of the internship was working with a charter school child. The child which I worked with was autistic and had many difficulties in learning. My charter school experience was an eye opener into how difficult a disability like Autism is for a child, parent, and a teacher. This child was very difficult to work with and handle, but he was a very kind and loving boy. Although he was in kindergarten, the work level had to be adapted to his needs. It was all hands on learning at a basic level. Communication was difficult as he could not speak. We had to use a lot of sign languages and gestures.

Shadowing kindergarten students was an enlightening experience for me. This was a challenge because I never attended school at this age in India. During my kindergarten experience, I got to observe the pain which teachers go through dealing with naughty students. I also got to see the different methods teachers used to engage with distracted children. Some of the methods which were used are calling on the child who is disruptive to assist giving out papers and having him/her sit next to the teacher's desk. It is difficult to teach a group of children when a few are disruptive and noncompliant.

Another school type of experience which I got to be a part of was observing a student who had English as her second language. This student was much older and had a one year old baby. She came from Afghanistan and spoke no English at all a year ago. Now she is learning 5th grade level vocabulary words and grammar. I enjoyed conversing with this student and correcting her oral grammar.

My final shadowing experience was at "Fitness with Friends", training facility near my house. From this experience, the owner and the trainer gave me lots of valuable information on how to study to become a fitness trainer. She gave me advice on completing courses online to gain qualification as a fitness trainer. Also, I should work fitness hours into my schedule while in college, to enable me to gain group trainer qualifications while still in college. I was shown the pathway of how I can become a personal trainer while in college and work in a gym. Nutrition was the last topic which upon which I focused. The trainer had many clients during the day and I shadowed her in teaching the client in maintaining her/his weight and diet. I learned that you should eat lots of carbohydrates every hour when you are working out all day long. I got to observe that there were many different types of clients. The clients' background were varied. Some were overweight trying to improve their lifestyle, while others were super fit and maintaining their fitness. Some clients did heavy lifting and some who only did cardio. During the shadowing, I gained insight into how super fit a trainer needs to be. The importance role nutrition plays in healthy lifestyle and fitness, and how important it is setting goals for better lifestyle, and eating habits. Overall I thoroughly enjoyed my fitness center experience and this is definitely a career I want to pursue in.

The students earned this opportunity after a stellar performance at a regional qualifier at Penn State in March. **THE ARTS -****AP Art History Class Travels to NYC**

Notre Dame’s AP Art History class traveled to New York City on Wednesday April 3. After an early departure, eleven students, Mrs. LaVelle and Mr. Olisky ventured to the city to experience the world of art. We arrived at Bryant Park and walked to our first destination, The Museum of Modern Art. There the students set out on a scavenger hunt to find a number of masterpieces from the required list of 250 images they will need to know for the AP exam. From Picasso to Van Gogh, students moved from floor to floor to take in all of the artwork. We then set out on a walking tour down Fifth Avenue to the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Students saw Lamassu from the citadel of Sargon II, Kneeling statue of Hatshepsut from the Mortuary temple of Hatshepsut, The Oxbow by Thomas Cole, Shiva as Lord of Dance, Monet’s Waterlilies, and the Burgers of Calais. Many recreated sculpture poses, but most simply stood in amazement at the spectacular variety of art from around the world. It has been a tradition of the ND art department to expose students to the history of art by having them see firsthand the paintings and sculptures that cultures have created throughout time. It was an experience to last a lifetime!








